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## **Olton Friary Church Roof Report September 2023**

**Thanks to the generosity** and hard work of people in the Friary parish, Phase One (the emergency phase) of the roof repair works of our Friary church has now been completed, well within the predicted budget and has all been paid for.

**Older parishioners will recall the great fire of Olton** in 1970 when half the church was burnt down, and was out of commission for 2 years.

The silver lining of that great tragedy was that the roof of the church nave was completely renewed, and half a century later is still mostly in a fair condition.

But the parts of the roof not renewed in 1970 were the (i) Lady Chapel, (ii) the Choir Chapel, (iii) the Sanctuary and (iv) the sacristy. These roofs, now 100 years old, have deteriorated badly in recent years.

Last year there serious leaks in all 4 areas, most dangerously in the sacristy, where rainwater dripped onto the fuse boxes, threatening short circuits and/or a fire. So doing nothing was not an option.

With advice from the Diocese and some specialist Architects, we commissioned a serious roof survey that showed major faults in the older roofs (built 1924) but also some weaknesses in the 1970 roof.
So Oliver Architects planned repair work in two phases. Phase one (now complete) was emergency repair work on the older deteriorating roofs. Phase two (not urgent) to take place in a couple of years or so.

**James Conservation** a Solihull historic buildings firm provided the most competitive tender and so work began in April, and finished in June.





Besides repairs to leaks attention was given to failing stonework and rainwater goods

\*The cost estimate in January for the repairs was around £158,000 \*The good news today is that the total bill amounted to £134,026 a saving of around £24,000

\*The reason? There was no need to use the planned contingency fund, as no serious unforeseen problems emerged during the work.

People in the parish were very generous. Individual donations raised well over  $\frac{2}{3}$  of the total. And some families each gave £1,000 or more.

Some tiles were saved in order to be recycled for Phase Two. The statue of Our Lady facing St. Bernards Rd was cleaned and repaired. Some small stone work repairs were also effected.

What remains to be done? For the time being we have done all the important work that required immediate attention

Phase Two, to be considered in a couple of years or so, is over the nave. Roof area is slightly larger but the failings are much less serious. But the urgent work (Phase One) has been done. Deo Gratias!
